"Nothing is being held back, except for a Picasso, which is on exhibit at the Centre Pompidou in a Cubist show and then is traveling to Switzerland," says AD100 garden designer Madison Cox, who wed Bergé shortly before his death last year. "Everything else is going on the block."
